Our passion and pride bear fruit! When you flip the pages of this newsletter, you will understand what I mean. Enjoy!





Julie Metz, AICP, is the Business & Membership Development Assistant Director/ARP Member Services Specialist at the North Carolina League of Municipalities. She graduated in 1991 with B.S. in Urban and Regional Planning from ECU. Before her current position, she was the Downtown Development Director of the City of Goldsboro, led the impressive downtown transformation, numerous awards locally and nationally.

"Downtown Goldsboro is now a thriving section of the Goldsboro community. It went from a vacancy rate of nearly 80% upon my hire to roughly 15% with a 5-to-1 return on the city's investment. But it is not the statistics that matter most in reflection. It is the overall feeling one gets when being in that place and how that place stirs them. Beyond my daughter, downtown Goldsboro will likely be my most recognized legacy. The legacy people see today is what inspired a current ECU honors student to claim planning as her degree ambition. That is the best feeling in the world," Julie says.

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Wes Hankins, FAICP



In a career spanning almost four decades, Wes Hankins, FAICP, has held a wide variety of both academic and professional roles—planner, professor, administrator, leader, mentor, researcher, board member, and head tennis coach for the East Carolina University (ECU) men's team. It is in his capacity as professor of planning, however, that Mr. Hankins has most deeply shaped the state of North Carolina.

In 1968, Mr. Hankins moved to North Carolina from Florida to fill a faculty position in the Department of Geography and Planning at ECU, a position he held until his retirement in 2005. Currently, Mr. Hankins serves as Associate Professor Emeritus in the Department of Urban and Regional Planning at ECU. Throughout his career, in addition to teaching countless geography and planning courses, he was also involved in many aspects of campus and community life and has authored and co-authored many articles and documents, mostly relating to planning education. Additionally, Mr. Hankins has received many awards, including recent recognition as an Outstanding Planning Faculty Member in the spring of 2004.

Perhaps his most important achievement involves his work in developing the Bachelor of Science in Urban and Regional Planning at ECU—a program that has trained dozens of the state's planning professionals. Additionally, he has served as an effective advocate for undergraduate planning education at the state and national level through the use of his numerous leadership positions in local, state, and national planning organizations. He has served NCAPA continuously for over 30 years in many capacities—as Vice President in 1978, President in 1979, Co-Chair of the Awards Committee, and as Chapter Historian since 1986. Moreover, he has been instrumental in hosting the NCAPA Summer Planning Institute—an event that has been held at ECU eight times over his career—and has taught a component of the AICP Review Course for the past ten years. In honor of his accomplishments and commitment to the field, Mr. Hankins was inducted into the AICP College of Fellows in 2004.

While Mr. Hankins has consistently placed a high priority on developing and maintaining relationships with national planning associations, his greatest influence is ultimately best measured by the success of the approximately 1,000 ECU planning alumni currently hard at work shaping the future of North Carolina.

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Degree Programs

Master of Science in Planning and Development

In Fall 2022, the first cohort of 15 students began their journey in the MS Planning and Development program. As of Fall 2023, there are 30 students in the program. Most of them are professional planners seeking advanced education in Planning for career.

Experiences during our first year guided us to strengthen the degree requirements, satisfy the course curriculum needs, and maximize student learning outcomes. The degree assessment requirement has been updated for the new catalog. Students must complete a comprehensive assessment, a curated portfolio submitted by students their work throughout their degree program. In addition to the regular semester-long



courses, the program offered summer courses, including six hours of credit for a faculty-led summer study abroad in South Korea. Although the classes are offered asynchronously, the

Accelerated Degree Program (4+1) Launched

BS Community and Regional Planning/ MS Planning and Development

Highly motivated undergraduate Planning students can now graduate with BS and MS degrees in five years. The accelerated Bachelor of Science in Community and Regional Planning/ Master of Science in Planning and Development ("Plan 4+1") is initiated while undergraduates are completing the bachelor's degree. Students admitted to the accelerated program may count up to 12 semester hours of graduate courses towards the completion of both the bachelor's degree and the master's degree.

With this Plan 4+1 program, the program will retain strong Community and Regional Planning undergraduates with the opportunity to streamline their progress into the Master of Planning and Development.

Two undergraduate students (Bella Sardina and William Lowery) have been accepted to this new accelerated degree program starting in Fall 2023.

Online + On Campus Development and Environmental Planning Certificate

With the new online MS degree program, the Community and Regional Planning Program has added an "online" graduate certificate in Development and Environmental Planning starting in Fall 2023. Students in other graduate programs such as Master's in public administration, Master's in business administration, or Master's in geography could enroll in this certificate program. The certificate requires successfully completing four planning classes and submitting a curated portfolio of their work.

More Faculty, More Opportunities



A.J. Jacobs Professor in Sociology. ECU + Adjunct Faculty in Planning Starting Fall 23

Dr. A.J. Jacobs has a PhD in Sociology and Urban Studies from Michigan State University and a Masters in Regional Planning from University of North Carolina Chapel Hill. Prior to coming to ECU in 2005, he taught land use, economic development, transportation, and housing courses full-time at the U. of Cincinnati, Michigan State, and Hosei University in Tokyo (1999-2005), and worked as an community economic development, transportation, and land use planner in North Carolina, Massachusetts, Michigan, and Florida (1985-1994). He has authored six books, 23 peer reviewed articles, and more than 60 book chapters, grant/ fellowship reports, and conference papers on development issues in America, Canada, Japan, Korea, and Europe.



Dr. Kaylyn Levine Assistant Professor Starting Fall 23

Dr. Levine's research draws from transportation planning, mobility justice, geographic information science, and critical disability studies. Her dissertation analyzed first and last mile access to public transit for disabled people in Austin, TX and Seattle, WA. This work suggests that perceptions of access and mobility stretch beyond what planners traditionally consider, especially for marginalized communities. Dr. Levine received her PhD in Community and Regional Planning from the University of Texas at Austin. She also has an MS in Applied Urban Science and Informatics from New York University and a BS in **Environmental Science** from the University of California, Los Angeles. She was a Dwight David Eisenhower Transportation Fellow in 2020. She

Michelle E. Nance, AICP is the Deputy Executive Director at Centralina Regional Council, leading regional planning, community economic development, government affairs and member services for nine counties in the Charlotte region. Her portfolio includes land use and transportation, economic and community resilience, healthy communities, grants management and public administration. Her work is focused on helping communities address local needs through planning, capacity building and peer networks while tackling shared, long-term opportunities through collaboration and partnerships.

Michelle received her Master of Public Administration and BS in Urban from ECU and has a certificate in Design Thinking from UNC Charlotte.



Lee Padrick Planner-in-Residence Starting Fall 23

Lee has worked at the NC Department of Commerce for the past 26 years and currently serves as the Chief **Economic Development** Planner. Lee's genuine passion lies in helping communities discover their uniqueness, recognizing what makes their area special, and transforming it into a sustainable economic development strategy. A known data enthusi-

ast, Lee finds joy in conducting market analyses for client communities and exploring the intricate local flow of money. As a proud alumnus of East Carolina University, Lee holds three degrees, a BS in Criminal Justice/Pre-Law, MPA in Public Administration, and MA in Geography.

Dr. Steven Richter Assistant Professor Starting Fall 22

Dr. Richter's work encompasses many aspects of human-environmental systems, with a particular focus on metropolitan regions across the United States. His quantitative research leverages the abundant and multi-faceted National Land Cover Database to understand how the quantity and quality of developed lands in the United States have evolved since 2000. This work seeks to inform planning and policy related to growth management, urban peripheries, disaster resilience, and urban ecology. This work revolves around the use of land-use scenarios that help communities better understand how different patterns of growth intersect with environmental risk.

Dr. Richter has a PhD and Masters in Community and Regional Planning from University of Texas at Austin.



Dr. Mukherji is currently leading a study funded by the National Oceanic Nelson Adeniji (MS Geography) and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) through the Climate Program Office's Adaptation Sciences (AdSCi) Program and composed of a diverse team of faculty and student researchers. This work is a partnership with local communities and looks at the intended and unintended consequences of buyout programs as an adaptive response to compound coastal water events (CCWEs). CCWEs are defined as a sequential or combined occurrence of extreme weather events. The research focuses on two rural, flood-prone, underserved, low-income communities in the Carolinas. The research will apply mixed methods to capture the benefits and costs of buyouts while addressing their fiscal and equity challenges. Dr. Mukherji is working with co-PIs Dr. Meghan Millea and Dr. Jamie Kruse at ECU, Dr. Scott Curtis at The Citadel, and Katie Finegan at South Carolina Sea Grant.

Student researchers on the team are and Bella Sardina (BS Planning to MS Planning Accelerated Program).

This study is a follow-on to a previous research project, also funded by NOAA, that assessed the perceived risks and needs of the hazard management and planning community in response to compound water hazards in rural coastal estuarine environments in eastern North Carolina. The result of this research work has been published in the Journal of Environmental Planning and Management, Progress in Disaster Science, and Natural Hazards and Earth System Sciences.


Dr. Mulatu Wubneh **Publishes Book Planning for Cities in Cri**sis: Lessons from Gondar, **Ethiopia**

Emeritus Professor Mulatu Wubneh recently published a book summarizing his experiences from Gondar, Ethiopia--a city he has been helping after his retirement.



"This book analyzes ancient cities that are facing crisis, and their coping mechanism to maintain resiliency and sustainability to remain economically viable and historically relevant. The book takes a fresh look at the underlying causes of the crises and recommends good governance and strategic planning options that the city could use to develop a robust economy using surveys and other materials, including geez (old Ethiopian language) church sources. This book illustrates the usage of the concepts of resilience and sustainability to critically assess the historical and cultural transformation of cities and the role of local government in maintaining a sustainable community." - Reprinted from the publisher's page.





Throughout the 2022-2023 academic year, the Student Planners' Action Network (SPAN) participated in a variety of activities which were categorized as being: Academic-Based, Service-Based, or Social-Based.

Academic-Based activities predominantly centered around SPAN's tradition of hosting 'Table Talks.' These talks were informal discussions, featuring one guest speaker at a time and highlighting their specific contributions and interests as relating to the Planning field. Students were given a small, relaxed environment in which they could ask questions and learn about various perspectives that are best provided by those with experience in their careers. Students were also able to attend a private Resume Building Workshop in partnership with ECU Career Services.
